Scholarships

Thanks to successful Nearly New Sales and generous donors, the Norwich Women's Club Scholarship Committee was able to award \$31,000 in scholarships for the 2010-2011 academic year.

The committee received twenty-eight completed, eligible applications from VSAC. The committee members evaluated the three required essays and financial information for each of the eligible applicants.

After reviewing the applications individually, the Committee met and decided to award eighteen scholarships - nine to 2010 high school graduates. Two of the seniors were named Woodworth Scholars in recognition of their community service efforts. A number of the returning students who received awards this year have received NWC scholarships in a prior year.

Raising many dollars for scholarships is one of the wonderful ways in which the NWC supports the Norwich Community.

FLORIBUNDA 2010

It certainly helped that we had an early spring this year, and that the weather on Saturday was sunny and mild. Visitors were ready to "think spring" – the crocuses in their gardens had just appeared.

It also helped to have a committee of talented and dedicated women who committed themselves to the success of this event. The planning took

months, and the execution went flawlessly. (If you run into one of the Floribunda Committee members in the Post Office, congratulate them on a job well done – they worked hard and long to make it happen.)

The café had a team of quick thinking people who made all the sandwiches just prior to serving them. They used quality meats and bread, tweaked the menu to make it appetizing but simple, and made more than enough home made desserts to serve the happy diners. The food was fresh and delicious.

This year we used the internet to boost our advertising. We published the silent auction list in advance on our website and on the Norwich and Lyme List Serves to build excitement. We joined the Upper Valley Chamber of Commerce to appear on their website. The numbers of visitors this year surpassed last year which was in large part due to the power of the web.

Many members came either as volunteers or as visitors and Tracy Hall looked colorful, alive and vibrant. The “buzz” in the crowd added to the atmosphere. Many vendors made special efforts with their displays, and the Hall was filled with excitement.

We were pleased to have local author and radio personality, Ron Krup, as a featured speaker during the day on Saturday. His presentations were entertaining and informative.

The big change this year was the addition of a Silent Auction. The donations were generously contributed by our members, by local businesses and by craftspeople, and ranged from unusual jewelry, to dinner parties in the bidder’s home, to travel packages to distant places like Savannah, GA and Prince Edward Island, and even the spaying or neutering of a pet! The items were displayed in a very attractive way and the bidding went on through both Saturday and Sunday with impressive results.

When the final numbers were totaled for this year’s Floribunda, we were all pleased. After expenses the total income including the gate, the café, the vendor rentals, and the silent auction, we cleared about \$14,800. 2010 income is better than all of the last three years (2009 was about \$10,300). And just as important as the proceeds, we all worked together and had fun together making it happen.
